History of the Forest Ranch Broom Education and Eradication Program (BEEP)

Part 2

The second goal was accomplished by physically going out there and removing stands of broom. As more members joined, BEEP had a core group of approximately a dozen people, who used to come out on Saturdays during the wet season and yank the lovely legumes out of the ground by hand or with tools such as a weed wrench, which looks kind of like a car jack with a long handle that allows the user to get enough leverage to pull the unwanted plants out by the roots, the best way to eliminate them. If that didn't work, the plant would have to be dug out, removing as much of the root system as possible. It was important to not let the plants go to bloom, for some sources say the seeds can survive up to sixty years. Meticulous records were kept, like how many plants were pulled, the size, the type and how large the plot was. Hours worked by each member was also recorded. The piles of broom left behind were disposed of in various ways, but were mostly chipped up.



BEEP offered to help homeowners clear broom off their property and removed large stands along highway 32, from Platt Mountain to Heavenly Glen. The group even went down to the Butte Creek Canyon Ecological Reserve and pulled out some monster Spanish broom, some well over six feet tall.

The BEEP outings, generally around three hours long, were not just work. They were fun. It was nice to be around people of like minds who cared about the health of the community. And no one went hungry. Team members would bring plenty of cookies or some other kind

of treat to share. Beepers moved around all over the Forest Ranch area to eradicate the broom or help on some other project, such as Labor of Love. The reward was that they often went to interesting places that they would normally not have access to, such as Little Chico Creek Canyon.

BEEP members often got outside help with pulls, such as from CCC workers and students from classes that CSU, Chico, Professor Don Hankins taught. In 2009, a trio of rock musicians from Boston, who earlier played at San Francisco's Filmore West and were slated to play in Chico later, joined, along with their crew, the Beepers and some CCCs on a wet, muddy day on Nopel Avenue to pull out what was reported to be 3,769 plants. The band, called "State Radio," made it part of their "tour package" to coordinate participation in community-service activities with their musical gigs.

BEEP raised funds in different ways to acquire needed supplies, such as tools. Gretchen Vandewalle created two lovely quilts that were raffled off, BEEP members created a cookbook filled with local recipes and local history (with historical photos) and even the Forest Ranch Charter School bought BEEP a weed wrench with money the

Unfortunately, BEEP participation has waned over the years and the broom is roaring back in places. As Gretchen Vandewalle says: "Educating homeowners and community leaders about the desirability of eradicating broom has been our most lasting legacy." Dulcy Schroeder observes that: "A lot of years have passed since 2006 and our charter team has aged out." The group needs new blood. Any volunteers out there?

Roy Gene Rolls October 15, 1930—December 24, 2023

Gene was born on October 15, 1930 to Ruby and James Rolls at home in Westwood, California. The family moved to Chico when he was 3 years old. Gene attended elementary school in Chico, graduated from Chico High School, and attended Chico State for 2 years.

He lived on Hooker Oak Ave. for many years. It was great because he had Bidwell Park as his playground. He rode bicycles and motorcycles all around the area. Later transitioning to cars at a later date. At the age of 13 years old he started pushing a broom at then Butte Pump and moved up the ladder from salesman to manager. After 47 years, 6 of which were in Saudia Ara-



bia, he retired, bought a new motor home and headed out. He traveled 7 times around the world, every state in the union and every providence of Canada.

He was married to Wilma Rolls for 33 years. From this union 2 sons James and Jeff were born and a few years later a daughter Brenda was born. He truly loved and supported them all through their lives. A few years later he remarried to Dorothy and they were married for 31 years.

He helped to form Forest Ranch Community Association and was its first president. Also an active member of the Forest Ranch Volunteer Fire Department, a charter member and helped with the building of the Forest Ranch Baptist Church. He was an amazing pump salesman and very generous person to anyone he could help. Many of the projects he was involved in in the North Valley and surrounding communities are still operating and bringing water to farm lands.

He moved to Forest Ranch in the 60's. And with the help of a contractor built the home that he lived in until just recently.

He loved metal detecting in the desert of Nevada with 2 close friends, Jerry and Collis. He even sold Garrett Metal Detectors for many years. He loved electronics, watches and finding coins among other things. He was a man that paid attention to details and learned to build upon information in learning. He passed this ability on his son Jeff who in turn passed it onto his grandson Justin.

Gene did great things in his life and was not afraid to tackle large and complex projects to achieve something. Some of his hobbies including building heath kits, building his first tv, building and racing motorcycles. He drove a bus to Chicago to bring busses back for a ministry at Pleasant Valley Baptist Church. He accepted Jesus Christ as his Savior and took his faith seriously giving generously to many projects.

The Rolls reputation was to buy quality tools so they would last. In the last few years with the coming of Harbour Freight he deviated from that a bit.

We are thankful to Robin for allowing him to stay in his home as long as possible. The Volunteer Fire Department for showing up and helping out as needed. For the excellent care he received from the caregivers at Amber Grove Place and Enloe Hospital.




