YESTERYEAR... TEN MILE HOUSE

When John Bidwell's Humboldt Wagon Road opened up the ridge between Big Chico Creek and Little Chico Creek for improved travel, during the early part of the 1860s, many people quickly settled on land along the new highway that held promise for development as a stopover for stage and teamster traffic. Water was a crucial requirement and most people built on places where it was easily obtained. This may be why property on the road ten miles out of Chico did not appear to get settled upon until 1872, when John Perkin's laid claim to it. At the time there appears to have been a small spring nearby, but with not enough water to accommodate a



way station for road travelers. By the end of the decade, however, after the place had changed hands several times, it was reported that water was hauled up from a nearby ravine, and travelers who watered their teams there were asked to pay a fee. In 1881, the news wrote that John McVey, who was the proprietor at the time, waived the fee if the user was willing to patronize the bar and table that the establishment also had to offer.

The Official Map of the County of Butte, California, 1877, shows a water tank down in the canyon east of the Ten-Mile House that likely stored the water before it was hauled up to the way station.

In 1895, the news reported that it was believed that the Ten-Mile House was the only place in northern California that sold water. Of course, we now know that no longer holds true.

In the 1880s, the Ten-Mile House was known for its organized bear hunts and turkey shoots, which were reported in the news on occasion. Billy Boness lived nearby, and during the 70s and 80s was probably considered the premier lion and bear hunter in the region. Billy once killed a huge mountain lion that was eventually stuffed and put on public exhibition for a couple of days, prompting the editor of the March 16, 1883, *Chico Enterprise* to remark, "The grizzly bear and the California lion, two of the great beasts of this coast, are rapidly disappearing, and will soon be seen only as this one is, in places where curiosities are kept." Although the latter species was able to escape this grim fate—barely—the editor was quite prophetic about the former. The California brown (a.k.a. grizzly) bear, once frequently seen roaming in the valley and mountains of the state, was hunted to extinction by the early twentieth century.

The Ten-Mile House was destroyed by fire, in 1886, when John Brown owned it. Fred Dorrett purchased the property, in 1887, and it is believed he rebuilt the house before it was sold the following year. By 1889, John Brown owned it once more. Like some other establishments along the Humboldt Road in those days, Ten-Mile House ownership changed hands frequently.

The Ten-Mile House was still in operation during 1904, when John Hollenbeck ran a little store there that sold tobacco, cigars and light refreshments. But it is unclear how long it served as a stop along the road after that.



Dino Lago and his wife, Nancy have been longtime residents of Forest Ranch, having built their house in 1992. Many of you may know Dino, as he has painted many houses in Forest Ranch.

FRCA MEETING October 19, 2022



The guest speaker for the FRCA General Meeting in October was Gilbert Mohtes-Chan, Public Information Officer for Caltrans, District 3.

He provided an overview of the fuel reduction work being done on Hwy 32. He explained that in addition to Caltrans crews, private contractors are also working. They are all working to reduce ladder fuels (mid-sized bushes or smaller trees which often allow the fire to jump up to the crown of taller trees).

One of the challenges is getting the best equipment. Caltrans was able to obtain a cone truck that had been on the auction block and refurbish it. Luckily, they share equipment which helps speed up the work.

Most of the questions from the audience was concerns about the spraying of herbicides; such as: "is it toxic?" "How long does it stay in the air?" "Is there a chance that it spreads to the properties adjacent to the highway?" Gilbert said he didn't have the immediate answers, but would look into and get back to us.

LABOR OF LOVE

On Saturday, October 29, 2022, a group of seven community volunteers turned out for the Forest Ranch Fire Safe Council's first "Labor of Love" event for the



2022-2023 season. Dressed in gloves and sturdy shoes, and equipped with saws, rakes, shovels, axes and mattocks, these Forest Ranch community members cleared the defensible space around the home of a neighbor in need.

"I would like to thank the labor of love that came to our house! You all worked so hard, it's beautiful! I'm just sorry I couldn't help. Bless you all! My husband, myself, and my father thank you." – Candace Fish, homeowner

The Labor of Love program is a grassroots effort of neighbor-to-neighbor support in ensuring homes are hardened in the face of increased risk due to wildfire. The Forest Ranch Fire Safe Council auctioned this year's first Labor of Love work day to the Fish household back in September at the annual Volunteer Fire Department barbeque. Workdays such as these are meant to not only directly help those in need, but also as an educational workshop for volunteers to learn more about the land management issues we face here. FRFSC facilitator Caitlin Dalby says "Defensible space or 'D-Space' is important to continue to engage our neighbors about. Since the beginning of 2022, 566 FR homes have been inspected by Cal Fire and 21% of those remain non-compliant. By engaging as a volunteer for these work days, neighbors learn the tools and techniques of land management and D-space requirements while making a difference for a fellow Forest Ranch resident."









