Are you ready for wildfire evacuation?

We've had many evacuations due to wildfire here in Butte County. And we've just passed the 15th anniversary of the 2008 Humbolt Fire, which caused a very large evacuation from the Paradise Ridge. The Humbolt Fire was also the catalyst for the development of Wildfire Ready Raccoon!!

As part of our 25th anniversary, we offer you these tips to ensure you are informed and prepared – then you can rest assured you are Ready for evacuation.

#1 Know your zone.

- Butte County has established individual evacuation zones that are used during emergencies requiring evacuations.
- You can find and memorize your zone number by going to BeReadyButte.com and typing in your address.

#2 Pack a Go Bag

- Make sure to add key items that you would want for a 72-hour evacuation.

#3 Create a Family Communication Plan

- Write down all your family's contacts and choose a designated meeting spot for emergencies.

JULY WATER TIPS

How much water does my garden need? How often should I water it? When should I water it? Many, even most, gardeners have pondered at least one of these questions. And while proper watering of your garden is not as complicated as it may seem at first glance, there are a few important steps you can follow to ensure your plants have the hydration they need to thrive.

KNOW YOUR SOIL: The type of soil you have directly impacts how much water your plants receive. Loam—a combination of sand, silt, and clay particles—absorbs water readily and is able to store it for use by plants. Heavy clay soil often holds too much water—it drains poorly and compacts easily. On the other hand, water runs quickly through sandy soil, leading to rapid drainage that, in turn, requires more frequent watering. Adding organic matter mitigates the problems associated with both sandy and clay soil. Amending soil with compost or other organic matter is also the best long-term strategy for conserving water.

THE ART OF WATERING: Where and when you water your plants really does make a difference when it comes to plant health and water conservation. Be sure to apply water directly to the soil's surface. Why? Roots intake water, and plant leaves do not need to be watered. Wet leaves, in fact, only increase the probability that your plants will develop foliar (or leaf) diseases. Watering in the morning allows leaves to dry quickly (reducing risk of disease) and conserves water. Watering too shallowly and too frequently are among the most common mistakes gardeners make. Instead, water deeply and thoroughly—doing so encourages roots to push more deeply into the soil, where moisture levels are more consistent. That, of course, means you won't need to water your plants as often. Remember that newly planted seeds and young seedlings/transplants that have shallow, developing root systems will need to be watered more frequently, whereas established plantings have deeper root systems and require less frequent watering.

ADD MULCH: Mulching soil around the base of plants reduces moisture loss to evaporation, conserving soil moisture and reducing the time you will spend watering your plants.

GROUPING PLANTS: Plants with similar watering needs in the garden will both decrease the time you spend watering and increase your ability to allocate water properly. Certain crops (such as onions and lettuce) as well as new plantings need shallow, more-frequent watering, whereas long-season plants like tomatoes need deeper, less-frequent watering.



Butte County Board of Supervisors Meeting: June 27, 2023

After a lengthy debate amongst the Board of Supervisors, where over 100 community members attended, and over 440 email comments. Many attendees advocated to keep the fire stations open year round. It was noted that this would reduce response times, maintain the home values as well as home insurance.

The Board of Supervisors voted to fund a one-time contingency payment of 1.3 million dollars for the 23/24 fiscal year. As a result, the three 'Amador' stations, Stirling City, Berry Creek and Jarbo Gap will be staffed this coming winter as well as restoring the Fire Protection Planning Fire Captain. It also means that all the county libraries will continue to operate at their current level.

As residents of a forest community, it is in our best interests to ensure that the Board of Supervisors work in our best interests regarding our fire safety. Since the contingency plan is only for one year, there will likely be a bond issue that we will need to vote on, as the contingency payment will expire in 2024.

American Flag Display

On June 14th, the Forest Ranch Lions Club put up the American Flag display down Nopel Ave. to commemorate Flag Day. The holiday commemorates the date in 1777 when the United States approved the design for its first national flag by resolution of the Second Continental Congress. In 1916 President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed June 14 as the official date for Flag Day, and in 1949 the U.S. Congress permanently established the date as National Flag Day.

The Lions will also be putting up the American Flag Display on Tuesday, July 4th from 8:00am to 6:00pm in celebration of Independence Day, the day the Continental Congress passed the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776. The Declaration announced the political separation of the 13 North American colonies from Great Britain.

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
