
History of BEEP Part 1

THIS WINTER GARDENING CHECKLIST

Winter gardening is an opportunity to keep your yard in order through the coldest months. Giving your trees and perennial beds a little attention this winter will help them be at their best when spring returns. Plus you can get a jump on weeds and pests, fortify your soil with compost, and start seeds indoors so you're ready for transplanting when the weather warms up again. The cold season is also a good time to do some maintenance on your garden



tools. Put the following winter gardening tasks on your to-do list so you'll be ready for your most successful growing season yet.

- * Clean bird feeders and keep them full of high-fat food. Birds need a lot of calories to stay warm in the winter, so put out foods like sunflower seeds, peanuts, and suet cakes, all of which have a high-fat content that birds can quickly digest and convert into energy. Every two weeks or so, clean the feeders with a solution that's 9 parts water and 1 part bleach. Scrub away any debris, rinse and dry the feeder, and refill it.
- * Watch out for weeds. Inspect your lawn, garden, and planting beds for weeds that pop up over the winter. Yes, some weeds keep growing despite the cold. Pull them out by hand or chop them out with a hoe while they're still small, destroying all the roots and underground parts. Put down mulch where you pull out weeds to keep them from returning.
- * Mulch perennial beds. Put 2 to 3 inches of compost, shredded leaves, or bark mulch on the bed to protect your plants' crowns and roots from temperature fluctuations.
- * Don't turn the compost pile during the winter. The compost will lose heat and break down even more slowly. Wait until spring to turn.
- * Recycle holiday evergreens. Cut branches from your live Christmas tree into 2- to 3-foot sections and use them as mulch for the garden and perennial beds. You can do the same with wreaths and swags. These lightweight, open branches let moisture reach the soil while insulating the roots and crowns of plants from extreme cold.
- * Prune trees. With the leaves off the trees, you can see dead, diseased, or damaged limbs more easily. Cut them off now while the tree is dormant, so you are not cutting away new growth.
- * DON'T prune spring blooming trees such as dogwood, magnolia, or redbud in the winter, or you'll get no flowers. Prune them after they bloom.
- * Protect deciduous fruit trees from diseases and pests. Smother the eggs of aphids, mites, and scale insects by spraying dormant oil on branches and trunks of apple, pear, peach, and other fruit
- * Order up those seed catalogues

History of the Forest Ranch Broom Education and Eradication Program (BEEP) Part 1

Introduced to the United States in the 1800s, primarily from Europe, the broom plant eventually established itself on the west coast and has become a noticeable feature of our local landscape. It was, and still is by some, highly prized as an ornamental plant and was also used for erosion control, especially along roadways. Here in the Forest Ranch area, we mainly have two species of the non-native plant: Spanish broom (Spartium junceum) and French broom (Genista monspessulana). However, Scotch broom (Cystisus scoparius) has been known to make an occasional appearance too. Although these plants are

pleasant to look at, with their bright yellow flowers, they pose a clear danger to the community of Forest Ranch and outlying areas. They are an invasive plant that grows vigorously and often chokes out native species that feed and shelter native wildlife. And the plant has high levels of combustible oils, which can burn like a match head when ignited—not good for high-risk fire areas, such as Forest Ranch. It was a problem, and something had to be done about it. **Enter Broom Education and Eradication Program (BEEP)**. The program started rather modestly on November 16, 2006, with a Forest Ranch Community Association program about broom. At the



meeting, Dulcy Schroeder passionately encouraged people there to start removing the plant from the ridge before it would find its way into the Chico Creek watershed and establish itself around these parts permanently. On December 15, 2006, the founding members of BEEP established the program, along with a mission, goals and a name. Early on, BEEP received outside support from several agencies, including the Butte County Resource Conservation District, Big Chico Creek Watershed Alliance, Friends of Bidwell Park, CA State Parks, Butte County Fire Safe Council, Big Chico Creek Ecological Reserve and Sierra Pacific Industries. Cal Trans, Cal Fire, California Native Plant Society's Mt. Lassen Chapter and the California Conservation Corps (CCC) also hopped on the bandwagon. These entities offered help in the form of physical assistance, advice, tools and funds, including help with writing grants. Today, BEEP and the Forest Ranch Fire Safe Council have joined forces, since much of their membership overlaps and they both focus on fire prevention. As the name implies, the first goal was to educate people, which was difficult considering how many were enamored with the plant's beauty and that it could easily take care of itself. The Forest Ranch Post ran educational articles for BEEP and the Forest Ranch Charter school let BEEP do some broom programs for the students, who would, in turn, educate parents. The group created a glossy brochure that explained why broom populations had to be controlled and how to start doing it. BEEP representatives were seen at most community events, such as the Fireman's Barbeque, and even put on a couple of events on their own.

The Forest Ranch Community Association held its first election of officers in 1980. In 1981 there was a lively election as three members vied for the Presidency and two candidates for the Vice Presidency. At that time, there were only four Directors (now we have six) in which eight candidates competed for the positions.

In 1981, one of the main concerns of the association was the speed of traffic (*still a concern!*). According to the *Planet* (an eight-page newspaper for Forest Ranch), FRCA petitioned for a moratorium on the use of phenoxy herbicides in the foothills and watershed areas of Butte County.

Many residents of Forest Ranch have served as officers in FRCA since its inception. Holding an office is an excellent way to contribute to the community. The Association oversees the center and hosts many events that benefit all of us. Please come to the General Meetings (February, April, June, August, October & December). Everyone is welcome and who knows, you may want to become a board member!


BINGO on New Year's Day!

The Forest Ranch Lions are planning on offering Bingo on a regular basis as a fundraiser.






RECYCLE NEWS

We hope with all the Holidays, you'll have more to be recycled this month. Over the past few months, anyone who brought in their CRV Recycling received an entry into a drawing for a Collapsible Fabric Bin(see picture below). This bin is great for storing empty CRV plastic bottles or aluminum cans to be recycled. Once emptied, they can be flattened for easy storage. We are only doing this special drawing while supplies last. Anyone who brings in their CRV Recycling on Jan 16th will receive an entry into January's drawing for a FREE Collapsible container. 
